This infographic will help you understand the difference between hazard and risk, two terms that are often incorrectly used as synonyms. A hazard is something that has the potential to cause harm, while risk is the likelihood of harm taking place based on exposure to that hazard.

HAZARD VS. RISK

HAZARD is the potential to cause harm



when crossing a road, cars are a hazard

HAZARD in foods can be...



physical for instance pieces of bones in fish products

biological for instance harmful bacteria, viruses or parasites

chemical for instance mercury in fish or acrylamide in starchy food

RISK is the likelihood of harm taking place

RISK

is determined by the exposure to a hazard
